Welcome & Purpose

Welcome to the Western Michigan University School of Social Work Field Education Program. As a Field Supervisor, you play a vital role in shaping the professional development of our BSW and MSW students across Foundation and Advanced levels. This handbook is designed to guide you in observing, supporting, and providing feedback to students throughout their placement year.

The expectations and observation areas outlined here align with the Council on Social Work Education (CSWE) competencies and WMU's commitment to preparing students for ethical, competent, and culturally responsive practice.

How to Use This Handbook

This handbook provides semester-specific observation areas for student development. The Fall section focuses on early placement skill-building, while the Spring section addresses skill consolidation and integration. Use the Notes sections to document observations, which will inform your midpoint and final evaluations.

For Advanced MSW students, the same observation areas apply, but expectations will be higher in terms of independence, complexity of cases handled, and integration of advanced practice skills.

Fall Semester – Early Placement Focus (BSW, MSW Foundation, MSW Concentration)

Observation Area	Key Behaviors to Look For	Notes
Orientation & Role Clarity	Understands agency mission, population served, and structure; can describe role and boundaries. Advanced MSW students should also demonstrate early leadership in role navigation.	
Professional Behavior & Adjustment	Demonstrates punctuality, preparedness, appropriate attire; adheres to confidentiality; responds to feedback. Advanced MSW students model professional behavior for peers.	
Supervision Engagement	Attends supervision regularly; comes prepared with questions/reflections; begins to apply feedback. Advanced MSW students bring case analysis and intervention plans for review.	
Skill Development & Application	Begins applying classroom learning to interactions; engages in observation/shadowing. Advanced MSW students initiate advanced assessment and intervention strategies.	
Cultural Responsiveness	Shows awareness of diversity, equity, and inclusion; identifies personal biases. Advanced MSW students apply culturally responsive and antioppressive strategies in casework.	
Documentation Skills	Practices note-taking and reporting with guidance; increasing accuracy. Advanced MSW students produce professional-level documentation.	
Integration of Theory & Practice	Begins linking classroom theories and policies to field experiences. Advanced MSW students integrate	

	specialized knowledge and advanced practice theories	
Critical Reflection & Self- Awareness	Reflects on experiences with guidance; begins identifying areas for growth. Advanced MSW students engage in complex ethical reflection and leadership in practice discussions.	

Spring Semester – Later Placement Focus (BSW, MSW Foundation, Advanced MSW)

Observation Area	Key Behaviors to Look For	Notes
Orientation & Role Clarity	Fully integrates into role; understands agency systems deeply; navigates role confidently. Advanced MSW students demonstrate program or policy-level leadership.	
Professional Behavior & Adjustment	Consistently models professionalism; anticipates needs; addresses issues proactively. Advanced MSW students act as mentors for other interns.	
Supervision Engagement	Uses supervision for complex consultation; integrates feedback seamlessly. Advanced MSW students bring evidencebased reasoning to supervision.	
Skill Development & Application	Applies assessment, intervention, and evaluation skills; manages caseloads confidently. Advanced MSW students engage in macrolevel or advanced clinical interventions.	
Cultural Responsiveness	Applies culturally responsive and anti-oppressive practices; advocates for equity. Advanced MSW students lead DEI-focused initiatives or advocacy efforts.	
Documentation Skills	Produces high-quality documentation; meets professional standards. Advanced MSW students complete complex documentation, such as grant or program evaluation reports.	
Integration of Theory & Practice	Integrates theory, policy, and practice; articulates intervention rationale. Advanced MSW students evaluate intervention outcomes using advanced frameworks.

Effective feedback is timely, specific, and supportive. Supervisors are encouraged to:-Provide feedback during or shortly after observed behavior.- Balance positive reinforcement with constructive suggestions.- Encourage student self-assessment before offering feedback.
