Econ 3100 Labor Economics

In this class, we examine the following topics (and more)

- Learn how supply and demand interact in competitive and noncompetitive labor markets.
- Focus on micro-level issues affecting workers and firms.
- Study how individuals decide whether to work and how many hours to supply.
- Understand how family choices and life-cycle factors shape labor market attachment.
- Analyze firms' hiring decisions, job creation, and job destruction.
- Extend the basic supply-demand model to account for differences across jobs and workers.
- Explore the role of human capital in shaping labor market outcomes.
- Examine modern labor market topics, including worker mobility and discrimination.
