

Ink Rhapsody: The Art of Lingnan Masters in Hong Kong

July 12th - October 26th

Opening summer 2025, this joint show by KIA and San Francisco's Asian Art Museum features Chinese paintings in two sections. Section 1 explores Yang Shanshen and his teacher Gao Jianfu, showcasing Lingnan school's traditions/innovations. Section 2 covers other Canton Lingnan artists and Hong Kong's 20th-century role in Chinese national painting. It aims to deepen understanding of southern Chinese ink art traditions via works from the Joy and Timothy Light Collection.
