
Did you know?

WMU Engineering Students Build Race Cars.

The Daytona 500 and NASCAR are widely discussed topics this time of year, but have you heard about the WMU Formula SAE Race Team? Approximately 50 WMU engineering and business students are collaborating to build this year's competitive car. The students secure sponsors who donate parts, facilities, machine time, and more.

Students work through the design process during the fall semester. Manufacturing primarily takes place on campus at the engineering school from January through March, and the 2025 EV model was revealed at an exhibition on April 6 at Floyd Hall. Following an industry shift to sustainability beginning in 2010, WMU transitioned from internal combustion engines to electric powertrains in 2024. Each year, they aim to improve the design for better performance.

The vehicles are judged on multiple aspects, guided by a 150-page rulebook that the students must follow when designing the cars. The international competition begins in June at Michigan International Speedway with university teams from Europe, South America, and 100 U.S. college teams. The cars must pass technical inspection before entering dynamic events such as autocross and endurance races. Event scores are tallied to determine the final competition ranking. WMU Seal Icon has Hidden Pictures.

The WMU seal sculpture in the circle drive at Sangren Mall is a well-known campus icon with hidden secrets. The icon was designed by artist Joshua Diedrich and created with local businesses such as Kingscott Architects, Kalleward Construction, and Alchemist Sculpture Foundry. The piece stands 23 feet tall and was crafted in bronze, concrete, and brown and gold granite. Gifts were used to finance a good portion of the cost. The bronze tree and seal components were all cast individually and assembled later. Look carefully for hidden pictures, including older campus architecture and university community members. All the people featured are representations of real people, except the football player. In a statement, the artist said some elements may never be seen due to the size and location.
