You Should Be Prepared For A Crisis

Environmental Health and Safety Specialist Cory Ghiringhelli discussed "Emergency Preparedness" at the Wellness Expo in November. The presentation focused on home-emergency preparation and offered tips on how your family can prepare for unexpected emergencies. Congratulations to Alexander Teal, an emerging technology specialist with University Libraries who won the drawing for the emergency kit displayed at the expo. Planning for a crisis reduces stress during an unexpected event and can protect your family and property. You can be ready for natural disasters, such as damaging weather and human-made disasters such as power outages and

civil unrest. Cory's tips include "run from water, hide from wind. Have a plan. Preparation is key."

An emergency plan should include contact telephone numbers, a plan for getting information, and knowledge of the policies of area sirens. You should keep an emergency kit that is easy to access and contains the essentials shown in the graphic above. The kit should have enough essentials for each household member, including pets, for 72 hours. All household members should know the emergency plan and be informed of risks and alerts. The plan should be reviewed and the kit updated every six to nine months. Many resources exist to purchase ready-made kits. The <u>FEMA website</u> has additional information on do-it-yourself kits. Just a Thought



Recently I heard that the windows on the south-facing wall of Rood Hall were a secret message in binary code. You can probably guess what happened next. I researched Rood Hall and learned some interesting facts.

Rood Hall was built in 1971 and dedicated to Dr. Paul Rood in 1974. Dr. Rood was an instructor at WMU who headed the physics department from 1944 to when he retired in 1964. The building is located on a 179-acre lot purchased in 1964 that would house the Bernhard Center, Sangren Hall, Everett Tower, and Rood Hall. The architecture firm that designed Rood Hall also designed the Pontiac Silver Dome and Ford Auditorium on the east side of Michigan.

The basement holds a six-megavolt tandem Van de Graff particle accelerator, with a dinosaur park in the grass directly above the machine. The physics department studies atoms and molecules using the particle accelerator to produce and accelerate charged particles into a beam for various uses. Aerospace technology, food quality, environmental applications, and the health field are just a few applications.

As for a secret message on the side of the building, well that is just folklore. Binary code ranges from 5 to 32 digits. Rood Hall has 13 digits per line for a total of 39 digits. I attempted to decipher a hidden message using various codes, but couldn't unearth a message of "Welcome to Western." A science major's wishful thinking, or a variable binary code I could not track down! You decide. --Karmella
