We Have a Mermaid on Campus!


One of the Chubby Mermaids, a four-person relay team of endurance swimmers from Michigan, is a familiar face in the WMU community. The team, including Tracey Lawie, General Manager of Miller Auditorium has participated in several Great Lakes swims, including the Mackinac Island Swim. the Mackinac Bridae Swim. and completed stage three of the Edmund Fitzgerald Memorial Swim. The 411-mile course, consisting of 17 stages, began at the wreck site of the Edmund Fitzgerald in the Canadian waters of Lake Superior. Swimmers completed over 33 days, ending in Detroit and symbolically delivering the iron ore. This swim was a tribute to the 29 men who lost their

The team swam a total of 18.5 miles and was accompanied by a U.S. Coast Guard escort through the locks. The swim ended on the shore at Sault Ste. Marie. A memorial ceremony was held on August 28 at the Mariners' Cathedral in Detroit, where the 66 swimmers celebrated their achievement and remembered the lost sailors.



The event raised over \$200,000, which will support the maintenance of the Whitefish Bay Lighthouse. The event drew significant media attention, and Tracey handled the spotlight like a seasoned pro.
