Minutes of 14 March 2023

**Call to Order**

The regular meeting of the Western Michigan University Faculty Senate Undergraduate Studies Council was called to order at 3:03 p.m. on 14 March 2023 via Webex video conferencing by Diane Riggs, chair

**Quorum**

A quorum was present.

**Agenda**

**Reports of Officers**

Chair Riggs announced that there are no proposals to review this week.

Ex Officio DeChano-Cook announced that elections for 2023-24 USC officers will be held at the April USC meeting. If interested in serving or remaining in office, please notify Ex Officio DeChano-Cook.

**Reports of University Representatives**

Witschi did not provide a report.

Martini reported that Merze Tate College has designed, built, and tested the new Student Success Hub system that is now ready to launch.

**New Business**

Tenney reported that Student Learning is up to 13 courses per semester. The Service-Learning Course Approval Committee (SLCAC) invited everyone to participate. SLCAC is not focusing on using the course attributes but rather focusing on getting partners and faculty back on-board following COVID. The SLCAC will return to the use of attributes in the fall. Tenney explained that an "attribute" is a code on course offerings that identifies when the class has a 15-hour service-learning requirement. Learning is assessed using surveys, rubrics, and other forms of evaluation. Assessment focuses on student learning and tracks students' experiences, what worked well, what did not, how we might improve, etc. Tenney explained that international service-learning opportunities include Engineers Without Borders and students traveling to India and South America. Chair Riggs asked what USC can do to support the SLCAC. Tenney explained

that SLCAC needs assistance with promoting service and experiential learning opportunities. Tenney explained the difference between service learning and internships: many internships are paid, and students are practicing the culmination of a program. Service-learning is usually more formative and provides students with opportunities to practice foundational skills earlier in their programs.

Easley reported on the Student Success Hub (SSH), which has been under development over the last 18 months. SSH can create and manage alerts, make referrals, generate text messages, facilitate live chats and appointments, support the student success team, create tasks and success plans, and track success program usage. A discussion was held regarding peer navigators, students who serve as support providers in connecting students with advisors. Advisors will be able to make notes in the SSH. There will be continued efforts to improve the processes through feedback from faculty, staff, and students. Student employee supervisors have access to these forms. Even a student can fill out a non-academic concern form for a friend or roommate. This will provide a more consistent process for anyone entering a concern for students.

Martini attended the meeting at 3:30 p.m.

Witschi joined the meeting at 3:31 p.m.

Lopez attended the meeting at 3:37 p.m.

DeChano-Cook reported that the Transfer of Credit Committee (TCC) has elected a chair and a vice chair for the remainder of the academic year. TCC is working to complete a list of abbreviations for shared terminology. One issue is whether courses that were accepted by departments for transfer can also count as WMU Essential Studies program credits. DeChano-Cook is scheduled to meet with Randy Ott to identify and explore the processes for transfer courses to count as a WMU Essential Studies course. The TCC will share accomplishments with Chair Riggs for the year-end report.

Martini presented a ChatGPT overview, a new artificial intelligence (AI). Most institutions of higher education are trying to keep up and respond to ChatGPT, which is being widely used. Many have concerns about academic integrity and plagiarism, but there are many more important considerations and possibilities to use ChatGPT in teaching. A guide will be created to help faculty respond to ChatGPT with syllabi language. There is more information about ChatGPT on the instructors' page at WMUx, along with links to the Office of Faculty Development AI workshops. [A ChatGPT learning community will be available in the near future](#). ChatGPT has interesting possibilities. There are also diversity, equity, and inclusion issues. ChatGPT writes in standard English style, but it will soon be able to replicate a student's writing style. Tarbox is available to meet with groups or individuals regarding ChatGPT.
